



### 5. Student Support and Progression

#### 5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services.

The Principal being the chairman of the IQAC committee periodically evaluates the various teaching methods and suggests improvements in teaching methods.

The ILS College publishes a prospectus as well as a handbook every year which enlightens its readers as regards the student support services every year along with the notice displayed on the notice board as well as the website of the college. The Principal of the College addresses the students and their parents and teaching at teachers at the beginning of the term. In her inaugural address, she enlightens students and their parents about the rules of discipline. This information broadly includes the information about the Placement cell, other cells working in the college, various autonomous diplomas, competitions, counselling sessions, annual medical checkup, anti-ragging committee and prevention from sexual harassment committee, which enlightens everybody as regards the values the college cherishes, as well as the activities at the college.

#### 5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

A faculty meeting is held periodically to take a survey of all the activities conducted by the College.

Academic progression of the students is assessed by analysis of the annual results. We compare results of students of the College with the overall result of the University. It is observed that the passing percentage and ranks of our students are higher than other colleges.



# 7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

Activities of the Corporate Law Cell :

The Corporate Law Cell organized a National Seminar on 'Competition Law' on 11<sup>th</sup> August 2012 with the aim to analyse the orders passed by the Competition Commission of India and to understand the emerging patterns in Competition Law adjudication in India. This seminar was a great success as it was marked by a large footfall of students, legal professionals and academicians alike. The seminar panel consisted of very distinguished persons who supervised the proceedings of the seminar, which was divided and conducted in two parts. The first part of the seminar dealt with deliberations on the CCI's DLF order; the second part consisted of the case study on CCI's Cement Cartel order. The first part of the seminar concerned the deliberations on the Order of the Competition Commission of India in the matter of Belaire Owners Association and the DLF. The format of the deliberation was such that two experts in the field of Competition Law, Shri Vaibhav Gaggar from Gaggar Associates and Shri Naval Chopra, Partner at Amarchand Mangaldas & Suresh & Shroff gave us detailed insight of the issues of the case and the arguments that were advanced by the two litigating parties. Their deliberation also touched upon the various economic concepts that are a part of Competition Law, such as the SSNIP Test. It certainly was a great learning experience for students who experienced learning in an altogether new format by using real life examples. The panellists for the seminar were :

- 1. Dr. Sanjay Kumar Pandey, Joint Director (Law), Capacity Building Division, Competition Commission of India.
- 2. Shri Avinash Ganu Avinash Ganu Associates, Pune
- 3. Smt. Avaantika Kakkar Counsel, Khaitan & Co. Mumbai
- 4. Smt. Garima Malhotra, Gaggar Associates.

In the second session, Ms. Avaantika Kakkar, Counsel, Khaitan & Co., Mumbai, presented a Harvard Model Case Study on the Order passed by the Competition Commission of India in the Cement Manufacturers Association case. The panel comprised of Dr. Sanjay Kumar Pandey and Shri Avinash Ganu. Ms. Kakkar gave a presentation on cartelization in general to brief the gathering on the position of Law. Afterwards, Ms. Kakkar interacted with the audience and analysed the different issues which were dealt by the CCI.

The impact of the seminar and the uniqueness of the manner in which the famous DLF case was presented in the form of rearguing it, was remarkable. One of the panellists Dr. Sanjay Kumar Pandey, Jt. Director (Law) of the Competition Commission of India, very much appreciated the unique manner in which the seminar was organized. As a result, the ILS Law College was

recognized as a knowledge partner of the Competition Commission of India which is a great achievement.

As a knowledge partner, we further wish to introduce a Diploma Course in Competition Law as this is an emerging area of law. We have received enthusiastic support from the prestigious law firm Amarchand Mangaldas for designing and conducting the course.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution (please see the format in the NAAC Self-study Manuals)

#### (I) Title of the Best Practices: ILS Contract Drafting Competition

#### Its main objectives:

- 1. To promote writing skills, critical thinking skills, plus increase proficiency in basic skills such as reading, analyzing and reasoning.
- 2. To give students a better understanding of the clauses necessary for a particular draft of contract and art of contract drafting in the best interest of their prospective clients.
- 3. To offer students an opportunity to think about all conflicts foreseen and unforeseen, and circumstances that may arise in future and how to avoid them through a better draft of contract.
- 4. To help students learn the art of legal drafting and nuances involved in it.

#### The Context:

This Competition is appreciated for its innovation and structure as the participants know only the broad and general aspect of the transaction for which they have to draft a contract at the time of registration. It would, in a small way, help offset the litigation-centric nature of law schools, and it would promote the notion of contract drafting as a discipline. This competition was started to create awareness about the future outcomes of a contract if not well drafted and how to achieve a well drafted contract.

#### The practice:

The ILS Law College organised First ILS Contract Drafting Competition on 28th January 2013 and 16th February 2013. The plan of the competition was unique. This competition was conceived as one of its kind, with the aim of promoting skills of contract drafting. A

transaction in the form of case outline is given to the students Practicing Advocates and Sitting as well as Retired Judges are called to adjudge the competition and Prizes are awarded to the Winner and Runner Up.

## **Brief Overview of the Competition:**

48 students participated in the Competition. The preliminary round of the written drafts took place on 28th January 2013 and the final round involving discussion with Judges took place on 16th February 2013.

The Competition has a unique design and plan. When students registered for participation, they knew the nature of transaction and very broad aspects involving the transaction for which they would draft the contract. The case outline was distributed to the students at the time of the competition. They wrote the contract with reference to the case outline without assistance of any books or materials. The contract was one for transfer of technology (machinery and know-how) from a foreign manufacturer to an Indian company in return of transfer of its shares.

Practicing advocates assessed 48 contracts in the preliminary round of assessment. Six best contracts from these moved to the final round. In the final round, each of the six participants discussed his/her contract with the judges.

Sulzer India sponsored prizes for two best contracts with First Prize getting a Pollock and Mulla's Indian Contract and Specific Relief Acts and Second Prize receiving Pollock and Mulla's Indian Contract Act.

**Limitation:** The outreach of the competition is not much for first and second year students as the law subjects as well as drafting are taught primarily in the course later. So we have to work on this by Demos, orientation and increase the outreach.

# (II) Title of the Best Practices: Justice V.M. Tarkunde Memorial National Parliamentary Debate

## Its main objectives:

- 1. To improve valuable analytical and speaking skills, and to enable the discussion of important issues, whether scientific, historical, religious or political.
- 2. To stimulate and refine communication skills that empowers individuals to speak for themselves, to discover and use their own voices.
- 3. To promote leadership skills among the students.

## The Context:

Law Schools focus on the text of legislations than its source. This makes it difficult for the students to understand and appreciate the object and socio-legal aspects behind that legislation which in turn makes it hard for them to interpret such law in the given context. To overcome this difficulty and to facilitate a better understanding of law to students this competition was conceived and started by the ILS Law College Pune. This competition was also started to contribute to the intellectual and ethical development of its participants by challenging them to make defensible judgments in which they must critically investigate complex issues, question given assumptions, evaluate the reliability of data and consider alternate perspectives. Furthermore, Moot Competitions only provide a law bound answers and thinking than a logical and strategic thinking, which is required for a lawyer in every case at stages prior to court, such as negotiation, mediation etc. Hence, to teach top-notch critical and strategic thinking skills, high quality research and argument production this competition was started.

#### The practice:

The Debating Society of ILS Law College in association with M/s Karanjawala and Co., New Delhi conceptualized and organized its first Parliamentary Debate at National Level as "1st Jusctice Tarkunde National Parliamentary Debate 2013". This competition was conceived as one of its kind, with the aim of promoting skills of debating following similar if not identical format and procedure of the parliament. The idea is that when "motions" (ideas for change or concern) are brought before the "house" (the governing body) the discussion should take a certain format so that the playing field is fair. First, there is a "government" team, consisting of three people, and an "opposition" team, also with three members. It is the government's job to support or uphold the "motion" (topic of the debate). Usually the government team discusses a problem in the topic area and has a specific proposal for change regarding that problem. It is the burden of the opposition team to play "devil's advocate," so to speak. The opposition team tries to find the weaknesses in the government's arguments. Thus, throughout the debate, the government and opposition teams clash on the issues regarding the problem in a back and forth fashion. A topic of debate called motion is provided to the few minutes before the competition. Awards and Cash Prizes for Winning Team, Runners Up and Semi Finalists including Best Speaker award, Cash Prize for Best Adjudicator and Second Best Adjudicator as well as Cash Prize for the Best Internal Adjudicator is also awarded.

#### **Brief Overview of the Competition:**

The competition was organised from 19th to 21st January 2013. The debate saw a participation of 30 teams and 40 adjudicators from all over the country including several prestigious institutions including IIT Bombay, NALSAR Hyderabad, RVCE Bangalore, NUJS Kolkata, NLU Jodhpur, MSRIT Bangalore and SLS Pune. The format of the debate was 3 on 3 Aisan's Parliamentary Debate. 5 prelim rounds were held on the first two days of

In the Final round, the motion for the debate was "This house will pay all members of the Indian Parliament an annual salary of Rupees Five Crores." Team Sodexo Cross comprising of students of IIT Bombay and SPIT Mumbai were adjudged winners.

## Analysis of Feedback Year 2012-13

The feedback was taken from 135 students from  $5^{\text{th}}$  year <u>(61 Students)</u> and  $3^{\text{rd}}$  year <u>(74 students)</u> about curriculum reform.

Following questions were asked

1	<ul><li>Whether there should be practical application/orientation?</li><li>69.8 % of the students answered in affirmative. 30.2% of students answered this question in negative.</li></ul>
1	Whether there should be more flexibility/ variety in choice of subject available? 65.75% of students answered this question in negative which shows that the current range of subjects provided as a part of curriculum is satisfactory. 34.25 % of students felt that there is need for providing more choice and flexibility.
1	Whether there is lack of legal subject in pre law years? 67.05% of students felt that the present curriculum is well designed and does not lack in any respect. However, 32.95% of the students felt that there is lack of legal subject in pre law years.
2	Do think there are enough supplementary and inter disciplinary courses available in the college? 56.4 % of the students think that there are enough supplementary and inter disciplinary courses available in the college. 23 % of the students have answered the questions in negative. Out of 20.7 % of the students 11.3 % of the students did not give any reply and 9.4% of the students opted for 'Can't say' Option.
