CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

ILS strengthens effective curriculum delivery by exposing maximum students to classroom teaching. Compulsory attendance policy assists in achieving teaching - learning goals. Transformative pedagogy is adopted to effectively deliver curriculum through well-equipped accessible library, ICT Facilities, up to date administrative, academic, infrastructural setup. Semester time table is prepared before beginning of session. Principal conducts meeting of all full time, part time and visiting faculty and instructs about courses, teaching goals, attendance, curriculum changes (if any) etc.. Specialization and individual interest of faculty is considered while allotting courses. Practicing lawyers are appointed to teach procedural laws and practical training papers to acquaint students with real court room practices. Through Lawyer's engagement, internship is provided to final year students for completing practical training paper. All elective courses are offered. Career Counselling cum orientation workshop is conducted for each Elective Course. Teaching plan with teaching methodology is prepared by teachers and submitted to IQAC. Academic calendar of all activities is prepared at beginning of semester in faculty meeting under Principal's supervision. Faculty and students are notified in advance about commencement and conclusion dates of teaching, enabling them to plan their teaching -learning schedule accordingly. Courses, course outcomes and contents are informed to students in introductory sessions. Coordinators are assigned to administer daily teaching activity. Daily report of teaching and syllabus covered is maintained by teachers in attendance sheet. Student involvement is ensured through interactive teaching like student teacher seminars, quizzes, presentations, etc. Recent developments in course

are catered by inviting guest speakers, brainstorming sessions of Cells and Centres. Online facility of recommending books to be purchased by library allows students and teachers to have requisite reading material at their disposal. Curricular and extra-curricular activities are conducted to support curriculum delivery for experiential learning. Students are given first-hand experience of dispute resolution through Trial Advocacy, Negotiation, Client Counselling, Judgment Writing etc. Remedial programs are designed for slow learners. Advanced learners are challenged by organising various competitions. Outcome of effective curriculum delivery is reflected in higher passing percentage and more number of students placed in University merit list. Principal reviews implementation of academic plans and coverage of syllabus. Feedback is obtained from students and teachers about curriculum delivery and is placed before College Development Committee for necessary actions. Report of academic activity is submitted to Principal and General Body. Affiliated programs have systemic constraints as no periodic updating takes place. Gap between curriculum and requirement of profession is bridged by offering programs under the banner of Indian Law Society titled as Towards Conscious Legal Education (TCLE). Syllabus, duration and examination pattern of these programs are designed by experts and notified to students well in advance. In collaboration with Sister institutions of ILS i.e. Institute of Advanced Legal Studies, Centre for Mental Health Law and Policy, Indian Law Society's Centre for Arbitration and Mediation, HEI ensures effective curriculum delivery by offering additional programs and competitions. Curriculum delivery assumes highest priority of institution and is achieved through a properly structured and well documented process.

the overall development of the institution and its students. The feedback system helps in knowing the strengths and weaknesses of the institutional practices. It ensures transparency in working. The well-implemented feedback

system opens up a neutral forum for the stakeholders to share their concerns, suggestions, and responses. A robust and continuous mechanism of collecting feedback from students, teachers, parents, alumni, and employers has been in practice. The feedbacks are collected at different intervals, on different issues from different stakeholders. Students as end-users of the institutional services are given an opportunity to share and reflect their concerns on the issues of curriculum, teaching-learning, and other related activities and facilities provided. Feedbacks from parents develop a platform for active interaction and enables institution to know the views of the parents on the efforts taken up by the institution in developing their wards. Feedbacks from employers and alumni help institution know the practical demands of legal profession enabling the teachers to train the students to become better professionals of tomorrow. Feedbacks from faculty help institution understand the problems and hurdles faced in the process of teaching-learning. Separate feedback relating to library facilities is taken not only from students and faculty members but from all of its possible users like ILS non-teaching staff and other visitors to the library. The feedback form is made available on the website of the college to have easy access with an aim to get maximum inputs. Feedback on value added programs offered at ILS is also taken. The feedback from stakeholders are collected, analyzed, suggestions are worked on to draw potential pointers helping in ensuring quality improvement. They are published on the website of the college. The analysis of the feedback is presented before the members of the College Development Committee and Management. Such communication helps in making the voices of stake holders reach to the members. The feedbacks are also discussed with the faculty and administrative staff to keep them abreast of relevant inputs and techniques for improvement. The planning and implementation, of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, is done keeping in mind the feedbacks and the insights shared. Action taken report is prepared annually to show how at the institutional level suggestions were adopted and implemented.

 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words) In the academic year 2018-19 Mentor Mentee System was implemented for all the years of B.A.LL.B., and LL.M. programs. A faculty member each was assigned to each division. In almost all of such assignments it was seen that the assigned teacher has been teaching the respective class for at least one semester. This ensured the Mentor and the Mentees weren't totally unfamiliar to each other and find it easy to develop a rapport. Mentors were given the following outline of the responsibilities: • To conduct regular interaction with Mentees to identify and address any grave issues • To keep a track of the attendance record of Mentees and counsel the defaulters It was also decided that at least one common meeting of the assigned class must be conducted each semester by the Mentor. Implementation: Mentors took one Common meeting each semester as decided and engaged in one on one mentoring throughout the year. Introduction of the Mentor-Mentee system, performance in the examination, problems regarding topics of the syllabus, issues regarding attendance, etc. were some of the topics of discussion in the common meetings. Even some grievances ranging from campus facilities to examinations and results were raised in the meeting. In such cases the students were guided to appropriate grievance redressal mechanisms available. One on one mentoring resulted in the discussion of a range of issues, from stress due to personal reasons to possible career paths after graduation. Being affiliated to SPPU we follow the assessment pattern set by the University. LL. B. Courses: - Internal Assessment in 2003 Pattern Continuous assessment is prescribed only for the final year students of three year and five year LL.B. courses. Practical Training: - Moot Court, Pre-trial
Preparation and trial Observation: 90 marks • Assessment of Moots Performance (30 Marks) - 3 class moots presentation • Client Counseling (15 marks) • Pre-trial Preparation (15 marks) • Case Follow-up: Civil and Criminal (30 marks) • Demo and guest lectures are conducted for the above and Students have to write the reports in a Journal. We rigorously implement the assessment norms prescribed by SPPU.- • Time Schedule and Cases for Moot Presentations is displayed on the notice board. • Advocates are allotted for taking case follow-up. Viva- Voce Examination: - 10 Marks- conducted by External and Internal Examiner. The schedule of the same is displayed on the notice board and website. Internal Assessment in 2017 Pattern • SPPU has introduced 80-20 pattern: (Internal Examination -20 marks, External Examination - 80 marks) per

semester. • Pattern of Internal written examination is provided by the SPPU. • Separate passing in internal and external examination is necessary. If a student fails in the internal examination, a re-test is to be conducted. • Marks of the internal assessment are uploaded by accessing the link provided by the University, as per the seat Numbers allocated to the students for external examination. • Journal is to be maintained for Professional Ethics and Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) paper (IV BA LLB. And II LL.B.) and the Paper in Drafting -Pleading (V BA LL.B. and III LL.B.) and Viva-voce is conducted at the end of the semester. • Assessment of Final Year Students for Practical Training Paper continues to be the same as per 2003 pattern.. • DLL and LW: - The students are required to undertake projects and Viva -Voce Examination at the end of the year on the basis of the project report. LL.M.:-The pattern of internal assessment is as per Credit System 2014 pattern - • The Internal and External examinations will have equal weightage of 50 • [Longish Term Paper - Total 15 marks] (10 Marks for L.T. P. Project and 5 marks for viva voce of L.T. P) OR • [Seminar Paper - Total 15 marks] (10 marks for seminar paper submission and 5 marks for oral presentation on seminar topic) • Tutorial - Maximum 5 • Assignment - Maximum 5 • Group Discussion / Open Book Test/ Library Research Work/ Extension Work (Total 5 marks) • 2 Written Test in each subject (10 marks each and Total 20 marks) Ph. D .: - Students undertake PhD coursework and are evaluated as per the SPPU norms. They are required to submit six monthly progress report that is reviewed by research advisory committee. • Autonomous Certificate and Diploma Courses are conducted for which the assessment is done internally.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The University prescribes the Number of days that would be available for teaching and evaluation of the students for all the courses including Diploma Courses. Teaching plans are made as per the University teaching schedules. The academic and evaluation planning process is as follows- • The Principal and the Faculty together frame the academic calendar at the beginning of each semester. In view of evaluation schedule of the University and vacation period, the timetable of internal assessment is prepared and displayed on the notice boards. . The Academic Calendar contains teaching plans, tentative dates of examinations and declaration of results, dates of registration for the examination, organization of extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, list of holidays, dates of Workshops and seminars to be organized during the academic year. • Evaluation schedule for University examinations is informed to the students and teachers as and when notified by the University. The details of internal exams, tutorials, topics for the Tutorials, projects, etc. are declared well in advance. • The teachers who teach Practical Training paper throughout the academic year of final year students of both the law courses make a timetable for the assessment of the various components of the paper and it is displayed in advance. The moot cases are given to the students well in advance so that they can prepare and make presentations in the class. The students are required to maintain journals and write the reports of their case follow-up, pre-trial preparation of civil and criminal case, client counseling session. The journal also includes summary of the arguments in moot court cases presented in the class. The journal is assessed from time to time for 90 marks. The viva-voce examination for 10 marks on the basis of journal is conducted at the end of the year. \cdot As per the academic schedule declared by SPPU, the Academic calendar for LL.M. Course is displayed on the notice board well before the term commences. The calendar displays dates for submission of synopsis of each of the four Long Term Paper topics and Dissertation. Date of two written tests and the Attendance rules are displayed as well. • The Indian Law Society runs supplementary Diploma and Certificate courses. In the beginning of the year, the detailed notice including the syllabus and the nature of Course is

displayed on the notice board and the website. The students are notified well in advance the days and timings on which the lectures are conducted. They are also notified about the schedule and pattern of assessment. Certificates are awarded to the meritorious students on Foundation day of Indian Law Society.

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

Practice 1: ILS Legal aid Centre ILS Legal Aid Centre imparts clinical legal education to students of the college and provides community service by giving access to legal services to poor and needy. Activities of the centre requires contribution from all stakeholders of college. Principal Vaijayanti Joshi and Assistant Professor Dr. Suvarna Nilakh supervise daily activities of the centre as coordinators. Activities to be carried out by the centre are decided after discussion in the faculty meeting, seeking inputs from all the faculty members. Considering the areas of interest and speciality, the work is allocated amongst all the faculty members. All faculty members are involved in one or other activity of the centre and are given liberty to plan and execute the work allocated to them. Students' creativity and enthusiasm is taken care of by giving them the role of student coordinators. Cases received at centre for consultation and advice are primarily dealt by faculty and students and then are forwarded to the panel of lawyers of the centre, maximum of whom are alumni of the college. Support from members of the industry is solicited, if needed. Lawyers, officials of District Legal Services Authority and Alumni of the college actively support the centre. The centre also receives support and assistance from sister institutions like Indian Law Society's Centre for Arbitration and Mediation and Centre for Mental Health Law and Policy. The Management of the college zealously supports the centre by providing sumptuous funds. It is truly an activity which receives participation of the management, all the faculty members, students, alumni, industry, NGOs as well as the community at large. Practice 2: "Remembering S. P. Sathe" Event Remembering S. P. Sathe comprises of 3 events: Public Memorial Lecture, Conference and Moot Court Competition, organised in the memory of former Principal of College, Late Professor SP Sathe. This was the 11th year of successfully organising this event. All three activities have a common theme, decided after deliberations in faculty meeting. Responsibility of the event is given to faculty members rotationally. Coordinator is free to design details of the event. Work is distributed amongst all the staff. Wherever required, support of alumni and management is solicited. Student participation is ensured by forming Student Organising Committee and inviting student volunteers. Public Memorial Lecture is delivered by a legal luminary of high stature. Conference receives participation from students, academicians and practising lawyers throughout India. Many Alumni and Industry experts are invited as resource persons for the conference. S. P. Sathe Moot Court Competition invites student participation throughout India. Alumni and faculty members are involved in drafting problems and judging the competition. Judges and lawyers are invited to judge final round of the competition. Students of ILS participate as competitors. Entire event receives participation and support from management and alumni. Corporate partnerships are entered with agencies like SCC Online. This flagship event of college, affords opportunity to faculty members to organize discussions on topics of their interest, in truly participative manner.

As a move towards greener and sustainable tomorrow, the ILS Law College ensures that the sufficient measures have been taken for Environmental Consciousness and Alternate Energy resources are adopted. They are as follows: - • Rainwater

Harvesting System: ILS has taken conscious efforts for the utilization of rainwater by the installation of Rainwater Harvesting Filter System. We have installed 6 Bore wells at the campus. The College uses rainwater harvesting structure for the means catching and holding rain water which optimally assists in raising the ground water levels and recharging the bore well. The rain water collected through this structure is used for watering the trees and plants at the campus and is also used for watering the open ground in the college. Additionally, an immense contribution of the bore well was realised when for the construction of the library of the college, the college utilised water from its own resources. More over if the college has to equate the amount of water it utilizes on campus by the use of water from these bore wells, it is equivalent to 5 water tankers (50,000 litres) that the college tends to save per day. It not only exhibits our self -sufficiency in terms of meeting our needs, but also cost efficiency in our functioning. • At the campus, we fully comply with environment conscious practices like having pedestrian friendly road (vehicles allowed only up to a certain limit), plastic free campus, encouraging students and staff for using public transport (and providing for pass concession), practicing paperless office by maximum communication done through mails and other virtual means. • Our college is landscaped with different varieties of trees and plants (both medicinal and endemic) and is a home to a variety of fauna. • Additionally, our college has taken earnest efforts for minimizing the lighting power requirements which is well seen in the infrastructural built up of the college. The college infrastructure has open corridors that eliminates use of lighting requirement, large sized windows and natural lighting with transparent roof sheets in the Library • LED bulbs -We ensure that the previous bulbs and lights are replaced with LED Lights wherever required. • Solar energy: The college has installed solar panels for the purpose of water heating at the Girls and Boys hostel and the Principal's residence. For the new girl's hostel, we have installed 32 Solar Panels (500litre) in the year 2018. • Percentage of annual power requirement of the Institution met by the renewable energy sources out of total power requirement - 0.3 [Annual power requirement met by the renewable energy sources (in KWH)-55200 / Total annual power requirement (in KWH) -1869747]

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1) Plastic Ban: With the Maharashtra Government notification on March 23rd 2018, on banning the usage of plastic, ILS Law College took earnest efforts to implement the same by banning its use on the college campus. Notices regarding the same were put up to sensitize the students. 2) Awareness and Sensitization:

Hariyali (Environmental Law Cell) ILS Hariyali - Environmental Law Cell is established to engage in raising awareness and sensitization about environmental issues. Conferences, Seminars, cleanliness drives, Tree Walks, sanctuary visit are organised under the cell as a step towards creating more responsible students and citizens. 3) Waste Management: ILS Law College has installed Organic Waste Composting Machine (OWC) at the campus. The machine uses bio sanitizer, fungus, bacteria (with enzymes) scientifically to process the solid waste It is Located near Boys and Girls Mess. Waste generated at the canteen, mess, other garden wastes is processed day to day in the machine. The Manure generated is used in garden to enhance fertility of soil. The fertile rich soil thereby promotes and boosts growth of plants and trees at the campus reflecting the institution's efforts towards green practices and enhancing its green cover. 4) Liquid waste management: Water Filtration Plant: The College has installed Water Filtration Plant at the swimming pool area which filters the pool water and pumps back the clean water in the swimming pool. The suspended particles are thereby removed which ensures clean water. This practice ensures optimum water conservation and near minimal wastage of water thereby exhibiting the institutions' effort towards environment sustainability. 5) Segregation of Dry and Wet Waste: The College complies to the rules of segregation of Dry and Wet waste generated at the Hostels, Mess, Canteen and residential quarters which is collected twice a week by the Pune Municipal Corporation waste collection vans. 6) Natural composting: In a conscious effort towards a healthier and eco-friendly environment, we have adopted a proven traditional method of "Natural composting", wherein all the dry leaves are accumulated at one place (Near Laxmi Building) and it is allowed to undergo the process of composting. This process not only ensures proper management of solid waste but gives the dual benefit of fetching rich compost which is used for soil conditioning and lawn dressing. 7) Pedestrian-friendly roads: We ensure that vehicles are permitted within specific limits of the campus. This enhances walkway path and pedestrian friendly roads. This ensure that our campus is ecofriendly without dust and pollution. 8) Paperless office: We promote the concept of having "Paperless office" by ensuring maximum communication through emails, social network groups and websites. All communications are done through emails. We use black boards for important notices for students. 9) Provision for adequate number of dustbins for disposal of waste generated.

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice I 1. Title - Judgment Writing Competitions We organize two Judgment writing competitions: a) Judgment Writing Competition in memory of Late Judge P.N. Behere b) Alternate Judgment Writing Competition (National level) 2. Objectives - • Develop justice Delivery Skills • Understand Judge's role in justice delivery process • Imparting and honing skills of authoring judgments • Develop skills of comprehending complicated facts and to frame issues of law • Develop active and impartial listening • Promote unbiased, fair and just reasoning • Impart a better understanding of the original and appellate level of justice system • Inculcating skills of presenting precise, articulate and systematic arrangement of concepts and arguments 3. The Context: Theses Competitions are unique in terms of forms of proceedings which trigger the practical and intellectual needs of students. Judge P.N. Behere was known

for his brief and timely judgment. The Competition is organized to imbibe these rare qualities of judge i.e. efficient brevity and precision with punctuality. The challenge before today's legal education is not merely creating adversarial lawyers, but equally efficient judges. Current legal education and BCI's emphasis on adversarial aspects of justice delivery system has led to creation of robust mooting culture. This leads to students preferring lucrative litigations or corporate practice over Judiciary. In light of these challenges, the Judgment Writing Competitions aim at inculcating the skills of judging, by putting students in the role of judges. a) Judgment Writing Competition in memory of Late Judge P. N. Behere: In this competition, the case outline is circulated one-week prior to competition for students to undertake preliminary research and acquaint with the subject matter of case. The brief (provided 2-3 days before) consisting of pleading, affidavits of the parties and documents are circulated a day before competition. On the day of the competition, the event is conducted in two phases. In first phase the proceedings akin to realtime court proceedings are witnessed by the students, wherein advocates argue before the presiding judge. At the end, the floor is open for questions from the participants. In the second phase, the participants are given a stipulated time of three hours to write judgment in formal format. Participants have access to material at the library. Judgements are assessed by judges or senior lawyers. The first two prizes are given to winners and a special prize is given for best judgment in Marathi. b) Alternate Judgment Writing Competition: The participants to author an alternate judgment based on the screened case by a specific date. The first edition was Intra College and later editions are national level. Brochure of the competition with citation of the case and rules is given publicity on prominent law blogs and website of the college. Invites are sent to law schools across India. The competition has two rounds: ? First Round - On assessment top 5 or 10 are selected for the second round. ? Second Round - Qualified students to make oral presentations of their alternate judgments at ILS Law College. Top three performers are selected by panel of experts on the basis of presentations. Evidence of Success: Following outcomes of the activities are the evidence of their success: • The successful execution of these competitions for consecutive eleven years (Judgment Writing) and four years (Alternate Judgment Writing) has let students shift from the dominant culture of mooting to Judgment Writing. • These two activities have received appreciation and contribution from the Bar and Bench in following ways: ? The competitions are mostly inaugurated and presided by the judges of Bombay High Court ? Senior Lawyers argue before the presiding judge creating an opportunity for students to audience their arguments ? Students are exposed to new and contemporary areas of law every year ? These competitions motivate students to choose judiciary as a career ? We have witnessed many students entering the field of subordinate judiciary ? From the year 2019-20, College has planned to organize this competition at National Level ? Participation of LL.M. students in Judgment Writing Competition is on a rise 4. Problems Encountered and Resources Required a) Judgment Writing Competition • Drafting a brief consisting of facts, evidence and arguments from both the sides based on an imaginary or existing case. We employ intellectual and expert resources of the lawyers and faculty in charge in drafting the brief. • Evaluation of judgments by experts whose availability due to professional commitments is a challenge. We seek assistance from State Judicial Academy and retired judges for evaluation. b) Alternate Judgment Writing Competition • Selection of relevant and appropriate judgment: Faculty-in-charge screens the judgments which are brief, relevant and capable of being analysed. Common Problems for both Competitions: The traditional and robust culture of mooting emphasise on the adversarial aspect of justice delivery system, which is outcome of existing pattern of legal education. Students are inclined towards mooting as compared to these competitions. We encourage and incentivize students to participate in these competitions. 5. Notes • Syllabi designed by the Bar Council of India and

University, do not have a module focusing on skills of writing judgment. • In adversarial justice system, the role of a skilled judge is important and hence,

this kind of training is imparted through these competitions • These competitions, contribute towards the process of nation-building, by motivating students to become good judges. These competitions are Best practices of ILS and tailor-made in structure and form, therefore are models to be adopted by other institutions. Best Practice II 1. Title - Establishment of Centres and Cells 2. Objectives - ILS institutes various Centres and Cells with an object of:- • Bridging the gap between curriculum and the needs of the profession. • To impart experiential learning through the practical activities of Centres and

Cells. • Addressing the cross-cutting issues like gender, equity, sustainability etc. • Taking Learning beyond classrooms. 3. The context Curriculum of Legal Education in India is mostly theory based with a very minimal emphasis on practical or skill orientation. As much is importance of the doctrinal studies, equally important is the experiential learning. The academic learning has to be complemented and supplemented with the practical skills and application in real practice. This leads to a challenge of making legal education merely a degree gathering event. To overcome this challenge,

ILS nurtures the culture of conceptualizing such complementary and supplementary activities in the form of variety of Centres and Cells to make legal education socially relevant. The Centres and Cells are voluntary activities conducted by teachers and students with maximum of academic autonomy and freedom, hence making it a learning experience. 4. The Practice • Centres and cells are instituted at the proposal of the teacher or students. • Aims and objectives of the Centres or Cells are identified clearly. • Activities are planned in advance for the whole year. • Activities are conducted jointly by the teachers and students in a systematic manner • Grant of funds and support of academic and physical resources by college. • Activities focus on research, community service, training etc. 5. Evidence of Success: Following factors reflect success of this practice • Consistently running for years • Students and Teachers participate voluntarily. • Quality publication of the Research outcome of the activities • Confidence posed in the quality of activities: by International Funding Agencies who funded the activities sumptuously, by Bombay High Court through nomination of judges to participate in activities and by State Women's Commission through publication and circulation of research outcome conducted by Women's Studies Centre in the form of Manuals. 6. Problems encountered and resources required • Lack of Financial Resources - All activities of Centres and Cells at ILS are conducted without charging additional fees from students. This consequently limits scope of the activity. We overcome this by soliciting sponsorships in the form of knowledge partnership or media partnership and deficit is met by Indian Law Society • Availability of Limited time schedule - Large variety of activities leads to clashes of time schedules, thereby making it difficult for students to choose one over the other activity. • To overcome this, students are advised to plan their participation by prioritizing a particular activity at a particular stage of their academic schedule, and to span the activities throughout the program. 7.
