Details of the activities conducted during Academic year 2022-23:

Student Seminar I

Title of Session: The Idea of Indigenous People: Are Tribal People Really Being Protected in

India?

Date: May 26, 2023

Mode: Online

Resource Persons: Shreya Patni (V BA LLB) and Sana Kulkarni (III BA LLB)

No. of Participants: 30

Report: The session began with an overview of the UN Declaration on Rights of Indigenous

People (UNDRIP) and its application in various countries. Post this, an attempt was made to

define Indigenous People since there's no accepted definition and it is largely debatable. It was

followed by the discussion on evolution of laws regarding rights of indigenous people from

1923 to 2023. Later, case studies of the Treaty of Waitangi (Maori Tribes) and the Pathalgadi

Movement were discussed in detail. The session finally concluded with various

recommendations made for the prospective changes in the Indian scenario, taking inspiration

from other communities throughout the world.

Student Seminar II

Title of Session: The Problem of Consent in International Law

Date: June 30, 2023

Mode: Online

Resource Persons: Shweta Shukla (VBALLB) and Anuradha Lawankar (IIBALLB)

No. of Participants: 22

Report: The session began with an overview of the idea of consent in international law and how much of international law is based on the notion of States' consent. Thereafter the pros of the current system and its flaws were discussed. This was followed by an overview of the exceptions to the rule of consent, i.e. customary international law, jus cogens, United Nation Security Council (UNSC), international organizations, and tribunals. Later, there was a discussion on a question posed to the students at the beginning of the session and after the overview of the current system, which is as follows: 'Since the current exceptions (CIL, jus cogens, UNSC, etc.) cover the most fundamental aspects of international law (maintenance of international peace and security), do we really need more/enhanced exceptions to cover the same/other aspects?' With this the session was concluded.

• Student Seminar III

Title of Session: Bringing the ICJ to the 21st Century: Overcoming Challenges

Date: July 31, 2023

Mode: Online

Resource Persons: Shweta Shukla (V BA LLB) and Pritesh Shende (IV BA LLB)

No. of Participants: 60

Report: The session began with an overview of the various challenges the ICJ has faced namely, national bias of the judges and State non-compliance with the court's judgements. Firstly, the issue of national bias was expounded upon, with the use of empirical data, the likelihood of judges, including ad hoc judges, to adopt the position of their respective governments was analyzed. The existence of national bias was proved to the attendees using this empirical data. After this, the Nicaragua (1986) judgment was discussed to establish two trends - the first being prior to 1986, where State compliance was comparatively less; the second being post-1986, where State compliance increased. This was followed by a discussion of various cases after 1986 where States initially did not comply with ICJ judgements, but

complied eventually. This was followed by a discussion on the various factors affecting State compliance. Finally, a question was presented to the audience: Whether the Ukraine v. Russia (Genocide Convention Case) could be considered the 'new Nicaragua' and whether it would

mark the beginning of a new trend in State compliance? To conclude, this question, as well as

the impact of Russia's current and suspected future non-compliance was discussed.

Student Seminar IV

Title of Session: From Arrest to Justice: Kulbhushan Jadhav and the VCCR Framework

Date: August 15, 2023

No. of Participants: 40

Report: The session focused on the Kulbhushan Jadhav case which was brought to the

International Court of Justice by India, with questions and arguments based upon the ambit of

the Vienna Convention on Consular Relations. The session revolved around the facts of the

case, the arguments put forth by both nations (India and Pakistan), the legal framework, the

jurisdiction of the ICJ for this particular matter and the post-verdict developments of the same.

Article 36 of the VCCR, Article 14 of the ICCPR and Articles 1 and 3 of the Optional Protocol

were the main focus of the session and were discussed. The session concluded with the

shortcomings of the VCCR, the post-verdict developments in both India and Pakistan, how this

judgment is supposed to shape the future diplomatic relations between the two nations and the

importance of the international conventions over domestic laws.

Student Seminar V

Title of Session: Introductory Session for First-Year students of ILS Law College.

Report: The session focused on the various activities that the CIL conducts throughout the year, the session served to inform the students about the skills and opportunities that it wishes to provide for them. This included encouraging students to research various topics of international law and write articles for the fortnightly newsletter, participate in sessions, as well as the Inter-Batch Model United Nations (MUN), and the annual conference on international law. Finally, it ended with a Question-and-Answer session where the core committee members answered queries that the students had about the functioning of the cell.

Student Seminar VI

Title of Session: Is Your Phone Powered by Child Labour?

Date: September 14, 2023

Mode: Online

Resource Persons: Abha Dalal (V BA LLB) and Pritesh Shende (IV BA LLB)

No. of Participants: 25

Report: The session began with an introduction and overview of the lawsuit against Apple, Google, Tesla and others (re child labour, DRC). The Democratic Republic of Congo, which provides about 70% of world supplies of cobalt, depends largely on forced child labour for cobalt mining. This cobalt is then used by the companies to make their electronic products. The session moved forward with discussing the risks involved in cobalt mining in DRC. Later, the arguments and submissions from plaintiffs and defendants were discussed in detail. The Plaintiff relied on The Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorisation Act, 2005 (TVPRA) of the US to obtain relief for children who were either maimed or killed during mining in cobalt caves and tunnels. The District Court of Columbia dismissed the case, stating that the provisions of TVPRA do not apply extraterritorially. The appeal in the present matter is pending. The session concluded with an elaborate discussion on whether private companies can be liable under international law for human rights violations, how States are implementing their international obligations through domestic legislation, and whether the world is moving towards a preference for ethical sourcing of goods. The Kimberly Process, US-Tuna II case, and US-Shrimp case were debated on to determine this.

Report: The session began with a discussion on the nature and scope of the competition. The basic tenets of MUNs, i.e. simulation, advocacy, and cooperation were discussed. The audience was taught how to streamline their research to align with the allotted Committee, Country, and Agenda. The 'advocacy' aspect of MUNs was then elaborated on. A simple explanation of the General Speakers List (GSL), how to prepare an opening speech, a position paper, a working paper, and a draft resolution was provided. In the end, the session reiterated the basic rules mentioned in the Rulebook and addressed some questions asked by the participants.

Student Seminar No. IX

Title of Session: The Polar Sea Controversy

Report: The session covered one of the problems that the world may face owing to climate

change - the melting of the Arctic polar sheet in the Northwestern Passage. Since the northwest

passage is strategically placed as a bridge connecting the Atlantic and the Pacific oceans, it is

of great importance as an alternative shipping passage to the Panama Canal. It is also a hotspot

for natural gas and petroleum. Thus, as the ice sheet recedes in the coming years, the passage

may open up as a permanent shipping route, as compared to the 4-6 week access in the summer.

This will make it viable for long-term drilling operations, leading to a frenzy amongst other

nations to send their ships. This session covered the unadjudicated dispute between Canada and

the U.S. regarding the status of the passage as an international strait. Canada has maintained

that the Northwestern Passage is not a strait and remains under the full control of its sovereignty,

while the U.S. claims that it is an international strait and thus, claims the right of transit passage.

Various intricacies of these arguments were covered, including the now revoked argument of

"Historical Claim" as proposed by Canada. Finally, the aspect of potential conflict was

discussed, as this dispute is now set to become an issue for many countries, and not just USA

and Canada.

Report: In this session, students were guided on key elements to increase the quality and

relevance of their articles. Emphasis has been placed on choosing a specific issue within the

sector, prioritizing international law over the politics of engagement. The importance of asking

substantive legal questions rather than theoretical questions was emphasized.

This was followed by a comprehensive discussion of access to research materials, including

books, databases, journals, blogs and reliable news sources. Students were encouraged to

diversify their sources to gain a well-rounded perspective. Considerable attention was paid to

structuring the content with a focus on avoiding plagiarism, unnecessary elaboration and

personal biases. Tools like Grammarly and ZeroGPT have been recommended for quality

assurance.

Participants were reminded to avoid common pitfalls, including repeating laws without analysis,

expressing personal opinions about morality, and presenting historical timelines without legal

insights. The collaborative nature of the writing process was emphasized and were encouraged

to submit draft articles for editorial review

Student Seminar No. XVII

Title of Session: Nicaragua v. Colombia: A Discussion

Date: December 28, 2023

No. of Participants: 25

Report: The session covered the 2023 judgment by the International Court of Justice in the

maritime delimitation dispute between Nicaragua and Colombia. In this, maritime boundaries

and the jurisdiction and rights of a state concerning those boundaries were explained and defined.

Attendees were made aware of maritime terms like the 'internal waters, territorial sea,

contiguous zones, exclusive economic zones and the continental shelves.' The previous

approaches of the ICJ in the 'Lotus Case' and the 'North Sea Continental Shelf Case' were

discussed and the contradictory approach adopted by the Court in this recent judgment was

analyzed accordingly. The relevance of 'opinio juris' and customary international law was the

main topic of discussion in the later part of the session. The session was highly interactive as the

attendees and the cell members indulged in various discussions concerning the laws involved in

the case and was a great learning opportunity for the students.

Title of Session: South Africa v. Israel: A Re-enactment of the Courtroom Battle

Report: The session focused on the live re-enactment of the case raised by South Africa at the

ICJ against Israel, accusing Israel of committing the crime of Genocide in Palestine.

The session revolved around the preliminary arguments put forth by the Agent of South Africa

against Israel to establish the accusation of committing genocide in the territory of Palestine. The

factors essential for the acts of a state to qualify as genocide were extensively put forth by the

agent of South Africa and how the acts of Israel fall under the same category.

The agent of Israel presented their case by challenging the accusations leveled by South Africa

against Israel and how the acts of Israel were a reaction to the attack by HAMAS on October 7,

2023 and must qualify as Self-Defence as defined under the UN Charter and the ICJ Statute. The

ICJ President acknowledged the arguments put forth by both parties and questions were raised

to both of them on the validity of their arguments. The session was highly interactive with the

audience getting the opportunity to ask their questions to both the agents and the chairs of the

ICJ. The issue of the 'intent' of an act for that act to qualify as a Genocidal act was extensively

discussed.

The session concluded with a discussion of the measures presented by the agent of South Africa

for Israel to acknowledge as the Israel- Palestine war continues to date and the reply of the agent

of Israel to those measures.

Panel Discussion: Russia Ukraine and the Israel-Palestine Conflicts: Role of International

Law

The panel provided exclusive intellectual insights into the global powers at play in the Russia—Ukraine and Israel-Palestine conflicts. A detailed discussion on the influence of these on international relations and vice-versa followed as the speakers delved into nitty-gritty aspects of international humanitarian law entwined with international politics, with a particular focus on the limited to negligible enforceability of international law.

Mr. Bokil talked about the role of international law in the Russia-Ukraine war and Israel-Palestine Conflict and how these conflicts have added a new perspective to international law especially with Article 51 of the UN Charter.Mr. Kunjir discussed the historical background of the state of Israel and how since its inception the region has been engulfed in conflict with Arab states and Palestine. Dr. Parimal provided the international relations' perspective to the conflict and how global politics has changed because of the two conflicts. Dr. Kadam discussed the conceptual aspects of International Humanitarian Law (IHL) and the fundamental principles of IHL applicable during armed conflicts.

The Panel Discussion ended with a Question and Answers Session.

The Newsletter:

The ILS Centre for International Law introduced its new fortnightly international law newsletter. The first newsletter published by the Cell was formally inaugurated by the Principal, Additional Charge of ILS Law College, Dr. Deepa Paturkar on September 22, 2022. It contains news, extra reading material, and a section to keep students updated about upcoming events concerning international law.
